

Message from the President of the Board of Trustees and the Director

he past year brought unprecedented challenges to The Columbus Museum as it did for organizations and businesses across the country due to the coronavirus pandemic. During the last three and a half months of the fiscal year, the Museum was closed to the public. The Museum quickly strengthened its online presence to create a virtual museum with offerings for all ages, including material designed specifically for teachers. This major accomplishment was only possible due to the Museum's talented staff, and the Virtual Museum will continue to be an important part of our future

programs. We learned that the Museum exists beyond our four walls; outreach through our online programs attracted audiences from around the country and world.

In the first months of the fiscal year, we completed our special project, *Making Conversation with Warren Williams Homes*, with the unveiling of a commissioned sculpture, *Making Conversations* by Deedee Morrison, at Warren Williams Homes on October 1. In January, the Georgia Association of Museums gave the Museum an award in the special projects category for the project. In June, the American Association for

State and Local History selected The Columbus Museum for its Award of Excellence for Leadership in History; we were one of only two museums in Georgia selected by AASLH for an award in 2020. We thank the Museum's Curator of History, Rebecca Bush, for her initial vision for this, the project team, and our partners at the Housing Authority of Columbus, Georgia, especially the residents of Warren Williams Homes. We are grateful to the Knight Foundation Fund of the Community Foundation of the Chattahoochee Valley and to the National Endowment for the Arts for their critical support.

The Museum presented five exhibitions during the year that are listed in this annual report. In February, performance artist and filmmaker Philip Haas spent two weeks at the Museum to present *Sculpture Breathes Life into Painting and Music*, which was seen by visitors and many K-12 and college students. Four other exhibitions planned for the spring were postponed until after the Museum reopened in July 2020.

The Museum introduced popular new programs for adults this year, including Yoga in the Galleries and Heist! An Interactive Evening of Mystery, during which 100 participants solved a local art "theft" by finding clues in our galleries. We continued to offer glassblowing classes and added a second weekend of classes last fall to meet demand.

We offered programming to elementary and middle school students in Housing Authority communities this year through generous grants from the Crime Prevention Program and the Rotary Club of Columbus. Our partnership with the Muscogee County School District remains central, as the relationships we have with teachers, principals, and school administrators enable us serve the district with supplemental education for students and teachers. The Museum debuted the PALS (Pre-K Art and Literacy in Schools) program, led by Lucy Kacir, the Museum's Director of Education and Engagement. PALS was held in classes at selected Muscogee County School District Title I schools. In the 2020-2021 fiscal year, the program is being offered at more MCSD schools.

After the Museum closed to the public on March 16, we recognized online content is difficult to access for some members of our community. To provide opportunities for all children to continue to engage with art and regional history, the Museum's education staff created more than 1,000 activity kits that were distributed to young residents

of public housing communities. We also distributed 4,400 activity booklets to students participating in the free lunch programs offered by the Muscogee County School District and Phenix City Schools. The booklets were made possible by generous contributions by donors and by an inkind donation from Communicorp.

The Museum had many notable acquisitions in 2019-2020, which are outlined in this annual report. We are especially grateful to the generous donors who gave gifts, which increased both the depth and breadth of the Museum's collections of American art and regional history.

At The Columbus Museum, we strive to make a positive difference in people's lives through our educational programs, collections and exhibitions, and events, and by seeking to create a welcoming experience for every visitor, whether online or in person. The Muscogee County School District's support of our facility and staff allows the Museum to provide services to the community and offer free general admission and free admission to nearly all our educational programs. Our unique partnership also gives us access to the expertise of MCSD educators, which makes our programs stronger for both students and teachers. We thank the taxpayers of Muscogee County and the Muscogee County School District for this important support. We are grateful for the contributions of our generous members and donors and for the support and dedication of our volunteers, docents, trustees, and community partners, especially during such a challenging year.

Award-winning Oral History Project Cements Connection to the Community

aking Conversation with Warren Williams Homes was a four-phase, 18-month project that included oral history interviews conducted by volunteers, resident dinners with brief historical programs, collaborative art-making activi-

ties for children and teens, and an exhibition at the Museum from December 2018 through May 2019. The culmination of the project was the installation of a sculpture of the same name in the Warren Williams community in October 2019, created by artist Deedee Morrison. *Making Conversation* was led by Rebecca Bush, Curator of History and Exhibitions Manager at The Columbus Museum.

"Making Conversation with Warren Williams Homes was a wonderful collaboration between the Museum's project team, the Housing Authority of Columbus, Georgia, and the residents, whose participation and input made the project possible," said Marianne Richter, Director of The Columbus Museum. "Curator of History Rebecca Bush had the original idea for the project, and her leadership and expertise as a public historian were integral to the project's success."

The Museum received a prestigious award from the American Association for State and Local History (AASLH) for work on the with project.

AALSH awards recognize "the most inspiring, engaging, and thought-provoking work in our field," according to a statement from the organization announcing the winners of the 75th Annual Leadership in History Awards. The 2020 Award of Excellence is the most prestigious recognition for achievement in the preservation and interpretation of state and local history.





Project driven by resident enthusiasm

The *Making Conversation* team included Bush, project coordinator Lila Stone Newberry, community engagement consultant Sherricka Day, and community outreach coordinator Kennan Ducey. The team met with Warren Williams residents to gather stories, impressions, and pictures of growing up in the homes or in similar neighborhoods. Residents were also encouraged to investigate their own history through genealogy resources and desktop computers provided by the project. *Making Conversation* was funded by the Knight Foundation Fund of the Community Foundation of the Chattahoochee Valley and the National Endowment for the Arts.

As a result of the project, the Museum's Education department has continued a partnership with the Housing Authority, providing art classes at public housing communities and distributing activity kits during the pandemic when workshops could no longer be held onsite.

"This was truly a resident-created project, from talking about their own lives in oral history interviews, to sharing images and objects for the exhibit, to creating the sculpture through their words and design choices while collaborating directly with the artist," said Rebecca Bush. "The project's success wouldn't have happened without the Warren Williams community's enthusiasm for celebrating their neighborhood and sharing their stories."

Prior to the start of the pandemic, The Columbus Museum's Education Department offered many new engaging programs, including yoga in the galleries, the sold-out Heist! interactive mystery scavenger hunt, and classes for educators and parents.






