What plants or flowers would you plant in your own garden?



DIRECTIONS

- 1. Gather your art supplies. You will need natural materials like leaves, flower petals, tree bark, or other mostly flat items that have a raised texture. You will also need crayons and paper.
- 2. Remove the paper wrapper from your crayon. You will get the best rubbing by laying your crayon on its side.
- Choose one of your nature objects and cover it will your paper. Gently hold it in place as you rub your crayon over the object lightly. You should start to see the outline of your object show up on your paper.
- 4. Experiment with different materials and arrangements. You may find that some of your objects make better rubbings than others. Can you create a repeating pattern with your objects?
- 5. Admire your finished artwork! What other objects can you make crayon rubbings with?
